SMRs in Estonia: key questions & perspectives

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Global SMR Watch

- Regular monthly calls since June 2023
- ~30 people (not all attend)
- ~15 countries (not all have nuclear)
- Key questions:
 - Will there be a western FOAK SMR?
 - Canada pushing ahead despite opposition.
 - What projects are getting cancelled?
 - NuScale, NUWARD, Newcleo (UK)...
 - Common strategies:
 - "harmonization", "derisking", narrative shift back to large reactors.

Estonian perspectives

- Nuclear ideas in 1960s and 2010s, no reactors still, small grid.
- 2019 Intense SMR industry campaign starts (Fermi Energy)
- 2020-2023 Governmental Nuclear Energy Working Group concludes that the introduction of SMRs in Estonia is feasible
- 2024 Parliament adopts a resolution "in principle" supporting **the preparation** of adoption of nuclear energy, establishing a **nuclear law** and a **regulator**
- 2025 Special state planning process for siting the first SMR started
- Still undecided if actually adopting nuclear energy in Estonia will be allowed
- Very unclear when and how and if such a decision will be taken
- Many unknowns on the technological aspects (reactors & waste management)

Unknowns

- Reactor designs:
 - BWRX-300? Still not licensed anywhere.
 - Alternative designs are far behind time-wise.
- Waste management:
 - DGR vs deep boreholes
 - How much waste will be generated
 - When to start dealing with the issue
 - Who and how will pay for it
 - Assumption: Operator fees for 60-year-long operation cycle on 90% capacity factor
 - Possibility: the average lifespan is actually 30 years and the capacity factor is only 45%
 - So: who pays for the missing 75% of needed funding?



Unknowns

Public subsidies

- o Past: industry claimed no need, government firmly said no subsidies will be planned
- Recent past: industry asking for subsidies, government still opposing
- Present: industry saying nothing can be built without subsidies, government now considering it (loan guarantees, but also possibly taking stakes in companies and issuing bailouts).
- No public participation

Civil Society participation

- ENGOs participating in the national working group sub-group on siting
 - Good interactions, but final decision was decided by majority voting
- Regular public opinion polls as "participation"
- ENGOs participating in the special state planning process
- Aarhus convention compliance are all options still on the table?

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
